Language

Living Abroad

Compared to Frankfurt, how high was the cost of living abroad? What additional expenses did you have during your semester abroad?

It was less than the costs in Frankfurt. I can recommend the supermarkets Billa and Tesco, which were not necessarily cheap but they were close, convenient and had a great variety. Mini markets are a good idea for cheap drinks/water and snacks. Other than food, most of my expenses were due to travelling.

How far were you able to travel with your semester ticket? How were the libraries? Was their use free? Did the university provide computer workplaces/ computer pools? Was Wi-Fi available on-campus? Did the university provide a sports program? Was this free of charge?

With RegioJet, the trips to Budapest or Vienna are very cheap and the food on the train is insanely cheap (drinks like coffee and water are free!). The public transport ticket was valid for all of Prague.

Off-campus life was fun as Prague offers a great nightlife, whether it is clubs, bars or boat parties. The ISC would try to organise fun events every now and then, such as culture evenings or lasertag. The cafeteria has great and cheap food with one vegetarian option. The library was well equipped with computers and quiet areas. There were also seperate rooms for groups or single students and study rooms available during the whole night. Wi-Fi was available in every facility and worked well.

There were a lot of different sports programs available but you had to be quick to sign up for a PE course of your choice that did not collide with any lecture or seminar.





Studying at the Host University

How would you describe the academic standard of classes compared to Frankfurt?

I liked how the professors tried to make the content practical and relatable with examples. It was very easy to understand the concept of what they are teaching this way.

The students are included in the lecture with exercises or presentations. One should be prepared to do a lot of presentations of previous work or specific topics. They tried to mix up Erasmus students with locals which was partially good but sometimes, those groups spoke their local language which made it harder to work in groups. Although, it was never bad enough to report it.

It is definitely an unforgettable experience and I would recommend staying at the dorms.
