I lived in district 8 in Szentkiralyi Utca. I would say it was a perfect location since I lived very close by the Jewish Quarter (5 min) and two supermarkets that were reachable within 2 minutes. Also public transport (Kalvin Ter, Astoria, Blaha) were reachable in less than 10 minutes walking. And the area was quiet during the night.

Arrival at the Partner University and Orientation

Which is the best arrival time?

A couple of days before university start in order to settle down a bit before the classes start.

How did you organize your arrival? Was the extent of the orientation program sufficient? What activities can you recommend? Were all important questions answered? Flights/ trains/ busses are cheap and frequently going to Budapest. Finding a flat was pretty easy but most of the time Erasmus students pay more than Hungarian students, so finding a cheap flat which is in a good condition without paying too much is almost impossible if one doesn't know any Hungarians.

Living Abroad

Compared to Frankfurt, how high was the cost of living abroad?

Lower, about 50%

What additional expenses did you have during your semester abroad? How far were you able to travel with your semester ticket? How was your student life off-campus? How were the Mensas/ student cafeterias? What types of meals were served? How much did the meals cost? How were the libraries? Was their use free? Did the university provide computer workplaces/ computer pools? Was Wi-Fi available on-campus? Were you able to use study rooms? Were you able to rent separate rooms for studying? Did the university provide a sports program? Was this free of charge?

I could travel a lot during my semester abroad. Since Budapest has a central position within Europa I was able to visit Bratislava, Krakow, Vienna and Ljubljana. Moreover I was able to visit other places in Hungary such as Eger, Szentendre, Lake Balaton and Visegrad. The trains in Hungary are really cheap and students get a certain discount. The monthly card for public transport is really cheap as well and costs about 10 Euros.

The cafeterias were not good in my eyes. They were cheap but not a lot of variety. The library of my university was not recommendable but there were others in Budapest (center) which everyone could use. Wi-Fi was available and worked. There were no real rooms for studying or meeting, just benches in the hallways.

Studying at the Host University

How would you describe the academic standard of classes compared to Frankfurt?

Much less challenging.

The teachers were really rude sometimes. I felt like back in school at some points. Sometimes they spoke still only Hungarian although they knew that Exchange students were in their classes.

Choosing courses and making the schedule for the semester was really difficult. We didn't get proper instructions and it was totally chaotic in the beginning.

I am sure that I gained a lot of experience during my semester abroad. I learned how to deal and live with people from different nationalities.
