Where have you been accommodated (name of dormitory, location, part of town, etc.)?

My accommodation was on the European side of Istanbul, in Eyüpsultan. It is a rather small town with mostly families with children and older people. There is a famous and big mall there called ISFANBUL which is very close (8 minutes walk) where you can do most things like grocery shopping, shopping, gym, bowling etc.). It is about 11km away from besiktas and beyoglu where most the night life takes place which may not seem like a lot, but in Istanbul, 11km will take you about an hour if not more because of traffic.

Which is the best arrival time?

Personally I think the best arrival time depends on whether you already have an accommodation or not. If you do, then a couple days before the introduction week is fine. If not, then at least a week before the introduction week is necessary to find an accommodation and get used to the city and your accommodation a little bit.

When I arrived, I stayed with my aunt because she lives close and my accommodation was not ready for me to move in yet. My university unfortunately did not make getting used to the city or the university easy as they did not offer any sort of campus tour or anything. I had to find out most things on my own by trying and failing and trying again. Getting in touch with the domestic students was not easy because of online classes, but once you got in touch with them for a group project, it was a pleasant experience because Turkish students are very social and talkative. They were ready to help when you had questions. You could not count on the university to help you.

Living Abroad

Compared to Frankfurt, how high was the cost of living abroad? What additional expenses did you have during your semester abroad?

If you want to buy fresh fruits and vegetables, I STRONGLY recommend buying them at the "pazar" which happens once a week and consists of many stands along a street. There, people sell fruits and vegetables that come directly from farmers and they are way cheaper and so much fresher. Even though it may seem intimidating because they are yelling to attract costumers, it is a great place to do grocery shopping and an unforgettable Turkish experience. To go shopping, I would not recommend stores like ZARA and H&M because the prices are the exact same as in Europe. I would recommend visiting smaller boutiques like CORAL which you can find everywhere (its like Bershka) and ASKI which is in Nisantasi and sells amazing trendy clothes for women for very little money.

With the semester ticket i could travel in all of Istanbul. My student life off-campus was good because there was lots of activities to do. The Mensa sold manly dishes with meat in them which was bad for a vegetarian like me, but the prices were okay. The coffee shops on campus were very expensive. The libraries were big and contained everything you needed. Their use was free. The university provided workplaces and computers and wifi. Study rooms were available. As far as I know, you could not ret rooms to study and also i could not find out about any university sports programs.

How would you describe the academic standard of classes compared to Frankfurt?
